Purpose of Report

The Draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan was endorsed by Council on 8 October 2018 and placed on public exhibition until Monday 12 November 2018.

The purpose of this report is to inform Council that several submissions were received during the notification period. As a result, some minor changes have been made to the plan with others noted.

Background

During 2018, LGNSW funded a program in partnership with the Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) to assist Councils throughout NSW to produce management plans for flying-fox camps within their LGAs.

Accordingly, through a Request for Quotation process, Biosis was engaged to develop the draft plan.

Albury City Council at its ordinary meeting on Monday 8 October 2018 resolved to:

- 1. Adopt the draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan;
- 2. Place the draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan on public exhibition for 28 days; and
- 3. If no submissions are received during the public exhibition period, adopt the draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan.

Issues

The public exhibition of the draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Management Plan concluded on 12 November 2018, with four submissions being received. The following table provides the name of the respondents, a summary of comments raised in their submission and the response to be taken considering their feedback.

Risk

- Business Risk The draft Management Plan proposes minimal interventions around the camp. A small staffing resource allocation will need to be required to continue to conduct welfare checks during extreme weather events and quarterly population fly-out counts. Some of this work may be undertaken by volunteers.
- Corporate Risk The Leaney's Bend location is ideal due to limited opportunity of bat and human interactions. The plan recommends limiting access to the public around the camp.
- WHS and Public Risk Flying-foxes, like all animals, carry pathogens that may pose human health risks. Limiting public access will reduce this risk.

Community Engagement

A steering group of key stakeholders has provided valuable input into the development of this plan.

Following Council's endorsement of the draft plan, it was placed on public exhibition for 28 days. Promotion of the exhibition of the draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan occurred via the AlburyCity website which included access to a full copy of the draft plan. The document was also displayed at each of Albury City's Customer Service Centres including 553 Kiewa Street, Library/Museum and Lavington Library.

Options

- 1. Receive and note submissions received in response to the public exhibition of the Draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan; and
- 2. Endorse the Draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan with amendments; or
- 3. Endorse the Draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan without amendments.

Conclusion

Public exhibition of the draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan has concluded with four submissions received. Minor amendments have been made to define the location of the camp and to articulate Council's endorsement of the plan. The wording 'ensure long-term occupation' of the camp has been changed to reflect 'long-term suitability of the camp'. A Site Specific Risk Assessment and Standard Operating Procedure will be developed to ensure Council staff and contractors work in close proximity to the camp once the plan is adopted.

The amended draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan is now recommended for adoption.

Recommendation

That Council:

- a. Receive and note submissions received in response to the public exhibition of the Draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan; and
- b. Adopt the Draft Padman Park (Leaney's Bend) Flying Fox Camp Management Plan with amendments as identified in Attachment 1.
